It was quite, it was quite an organised thing because they had a little railway that run right round the camp and they used to bake their own bread and everything, the prisoners did. And eh, this little railway used to convey everything that was needed right round the camp. Dropped off and eh, aye they had a paper as well, a magazine. And eh...

And concerts and things like that in the First War as well or was that more the second?

Reene Currie

Oh yes, aye [pause] yes, there seemed to be ... they had a very good hospital. Everything that was necessary was there, in the hospital. Yes I remember when we were kids we used to go and have a look in and wonder what that was for and wonder what this was for. [Laughs] Yes.

Ian Landles

And did the Hawick doctors service that hospital or were there special, did they have their own?

Reene Currie

Oh they had their own medics. They had their own medics.
